New York: Simon and Schuster, 1984 [This popular and well written biography by a famous historian is a useful source of background information on the President and events during his administration. See Chapter 22 for comments on the U-2 and the missile gap and Chapter 24 for coverage of the U-2 Incident and the Paris Summit Conference.]

Ambrose, Stephen E. and Richard H. Immerman. <u>Ike's Spies: Eisenhower and the Intelligence Community</u>. Garden City, NY: Doubleday, 1981

[See Chapters 19 & 20 for discussion of the U-2 and earlier chapters for other intelligence experiences of Dwight Eisenhower including World War II and use of ULTRA.]

Beschloss, Michael R. MAYDAY: Eisenhower, Khrushchev, and the U-2 Affair. New York: Harper and Row, 1986.

[A well written account of the U-2 Affair and US-Soviet relations by a prominent historian.]

Bissell, Richard M., Jr. <u>Reflections of a Cold Warrior</u>. London, England and New Haven, Connecticut: Yale University Press, 1996

[CIA official's memoir written with assistance from a scholar, Jonathan Lewis. See particularly Chapter 5, "Overhead Reconnaissance"]

Brendon, Piers. Ike: His Life and Times. New York: Harper & Row, 1986. A biography by an English writer.

[Can compare his views on Eisenhower with those of Stephen Ambrose. Chapter 20 "Down from the Summit" covers the U-2 Incident ]

Bundy, McGeorge. Danger and Survival. New York: Random House, 1988

[A history of US strategic thinking and posture from World War II to the 1980s. Suggest Chapter VI, "Eisenhower: Theory and Practice", Chapter VII "Into the Missile Age" and Chapter VIII "Khrushchev, Berlin and the West".]

Burrows, William E. <u>By Any Means Necessary: America's Secret Air War in the Cold War</u>. New York: Farrar, Straus and Giraux, 2001

[This is a quite readable account of US aerial intelligence gathering operations on the periphery as well as directly over the USSR, based in part on research at the Eisenhower Library. Chapter 7 contains discussion of the U-2 and RB-47 incidents while Chapter 8 includes information on the A-12 aircraft designed as successor to the U-2]

Eisenhower, Dwight D. <u>The White House Years: Mandate for Change, 1953-1956</u>. Garden City, NY: Doubleday, 1963

[This first volume of Eisenhower's memoirs offers his published views of cold war developments during his first term and can be a source of background information.]

Eisenhower, Dwight D. <u>The White House Years: Waging Peace</u>, 1956-1961. Garden City, NY: Doubleday, 1965.

[This second volume of President Eisenhower's memoirs includes his account of the U-2 Incident in Chapter XXIII, "The Summit That Never Was".]

Greenstein, Fred I. <u>The Hidden-Hand Presidency</u>: <u>Eisenhower as Leader</u>. New York: Basic Books, 1982.

[This is a study of President Eisenhower's leadership style.]

Hall, R. Cargill. NRO History: Early Cold War Strategic Reconnaissance. Washington, DC: Office of the Historian, National Reconnaissance Office, 2003

[This collection of 4 articles written at various times by the NRO Historian, Cargill Hall provides good detailed accounts of the early developments in US Government reconnaissance activities including background of CORONA. These are a good source for picking up names of key personnel and terminology.]

- Parmet, Herbert S. <u>Eisenhower and the American Crusades</u>. New York: Macmillan, 1972 [An older but still useful study of Eisenhower although weighted heavily toward the 1952 Campaign and its background.]
- Pach, Chester J. & Richardson, Elmo. <u>The Presidency of Dwight D. Eisenhower</u>. (Revised Edition) Lawrence, Kansas: University Press of Kansas, 1991. [This is a short but readable survey of Dwight Eisenhower's Presidency.]

Watson, Robert J. <u>History of the Office of the Secretary of Defense</u>, <u>Volume IV</u>: <u>Into the Missile Age</u>, <u>1956-1960</u>. Washington, DC: Historical Office, Office of the Secretary of Defense</u>, 1997.

[This detailed (almost 1000 pages) volume in the <u>History of the Office of the Secretary of Defense</u> series contains a wealth of information on US defense posture and strategy during Eisenhower Administration's second term. See Chapter VII, "Missile Problems and Progress, 1956-1958", Chapter XII, "Missiles, Satellites and Space, 1958-1960" for information on reconnaissance satellites and military uses of outer space and Chapter XXI, "Arms Control" for discussion of the U-2 Incident and the Paris Summit Conference.]
